Adam S. Hoffinger is a partner in the Washington, D.C. office of the law firm Morrison & Foerster LLP, where he has a litigation and trial practice with an emphasis on complex civil and white collar criminal matters, including securities, health care, money laundering, *qui tam*, Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, antitrust, environmental, and RICO. From 1985 to 1990, Mr. Hoffinger served as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York; in 1990, he received the Director's Award for Superior Performance from the U.S. Department of Justice. He is an adjunct professor at George Washington University Law School, and has been an instructor at Georgetown University Law Center (National Institute of Trial Advocacy), George Mason University Law School, and the Federal Judicial Center.
