Speakers' Biographies

The Honorable Dick Thornburgh served as Governor of Pennsylvania, Attorney General of the United States, and Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations during a public career which spanned over 25 years. He is currently counsel to the international law firm of K&L Gates LLP in its Washington, D.C. office. He is the Chairman of Washington Legal Foundation's Legal Policy Advisory Board.

Cory L. Andrews is Senior Litigation Counsel for the Washington Legal Foundation (WLF). Mr. Andrews regularly litigates in state and federal court, and has acted as WLF's lead counsel in many of the *amicus* briefs WLF files with the U.S. Supreme Court. He was counsel of record for WLF in three constitutional challenges to the Affordable Care Act: *State of Florida v. HHS* (11th Circuit), *Thomas More Law Center v. Obama* (6th Circuit), and *Virginia v. Sebelius* (4th Circuit).

Carter Phillips is the Managing Partner of the Washington, D.C. office of the law firm Sidley Austin LLP, and is a member of the firm's Management Committee. He served as a law clerk to both Judge Robert Sprecher on the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit and Chief Justice Warren E. Burger on the United States Supreme Court. Mr. Phillips served as Assistant to the Solicitor General and argued nine cases on behalf of the federal government in the United States Supreme Court. Since joining Sidley, Mr. Phillips has argued 65 cases in the Supreme Court. His 74 arguments before that Court are the most of any lawyer currently in private practice.

Douglas Hallward-Driemeier is a partner with the law firm Ropes & Gray LLP. He leads the firm's Appellate and Supreme Court practice, and has presented more than 40 appellate arguments, including before the U.S. Supreme Court and every federal circuit court of appeals. Mr. Hallward-Driemeier rejoined Ropes & Gray in 2010 after spending more than a decade handling civil appeals and Supreme Court litigation for the U.S. Department of Justice. Between 2004 and 2009, he was an Assistant to the Solicitor General, where he briefed and argued cases on behalf of the United States before the Supreme Court. He has argued thirteen cases before the Supreme Court and filed more than 150 briefs in that Court.
